grassland subject to fires, 1,515 m., *Greenway* 3655 (Herb. Univ. Calif. nº 513249) type.

Known only from the type locality where it was collected Sept. 1, 1933.

3c. Crepis bumbensis subsp. kundensis Babcock subsp. nov.

Planta 40-50 cm. alta; folia caudicalia 6-16 cm. longa, 1.5-4 cm. lata, puberula vel glabriuscula; involucrum 9-10 mm. longum, squamae interiores glanduloso-pubescentes et setosae ad apicem, setae crassiusculae; corolla ca. 11 mm. longa; antherae 3.5 mm. longae. Achaenia ca. 7 mm. longa; pappus 6 mm. longus.

Plant 40-50 cm. high; caudical leaves 6-16 cm. long, 1.5-4 cm. wide, puberulous especially on veins or glabrescent; involucre 9-10 mm. long; inner involucral bracts gland-pubescent and black-setose toward apex, the setae short and broad-based, becoming strongly carinate and pale spongy-thickened at base at full maturity; corolla ca. 11 mm. long; ligule ca. 1.5 mm. wide; corolla-tube pubescent from base to summit, as on lower part of ligule, with stout papilliform and acicular hairs ca. 0.05 mm. long disposed singly or in groups; anther-tube 3.5 mm. long; appendages 0.6 mm. long, oblong, acute, united; style-branches 1.25 mm. long, 0.1 mm. wide, slightly attenuate at tip, yellow. Achenes ca. 7 mm. long, coarsely beaked as in typica and ribbed to summit; pappus 6 mm. long.

Cameroon: savannas of the lower highlands, ca. 6° N, 14° E, near Kunde, Kisare, *Mildbraed* 9214 (Herb. Berol.) type; in fruit in Feb. (?) or May (?).

SOUTHEASTERN NIGERIA: Bamenda, Bambuluc, Thorbecke 214 (Herb. Berol.).

Observation. — Crepis bumbensis is rather close to C. congoensis Babcock which occurs in the same general region and it is intermediate between C. congoensis and C. hypochaeridea (DC.) Thell. It is less close to C. cameroonica Babcock and its large-flowered allies of eastern Africa.

4. Crepis Gossweileri S. Moore, in Jour. Linn. Soc., XLVII, p. 282 (1925).

Perennial, 75-80 cm. high; caudex vertical, 1 cm. wide at summit, leafy at crown; caudical leaves up to 14 cm. long, 2.5 cm. wide,
